

Theoharis David was born in the USA of Cypriot parentage. He received a Bachelor of Architecture degree from Pratt Institute and a Master of Architecture degree from Yale University, where he studied with Sybil Moholy-Nagy, Serge Chermayeff and Paul Rudolph. He has since 1974 been in private practice as design principal of his eponymous firm in New York City and Cyprus. He is Professor of Architecture at Pratt teaching graduate and undergraduate design, a former Chair of Graduate Architecture and Faculty President of the School of Architecture. and has been named Pratt Institute's Distinguished Teacher for 2013-2014. He is also visiting professor at the University of Cyprus



Theo. David is Fellow Emeritus of the American Institute of Architects and has been active in design awards programs including the Aga Khan Award, and the Cyprus State Architecture Awards, He has served as Chair of the NYC/AIA distinguished architecture awards, as president of CIMA (Congress of International Modern Architects) and Chair of the APA Committee on NYC Waterfront. He has served on a number of boards including the Cyprus Cultural Foundation and the Pratt Board of Trustees. His architecture has received awards in the United States at city, state and national levels. He received the 2009 Cyprus Architects Association Prize in Architecture, the 2001 Cyprus State Award for Architecture for the New G.S.P. Stadium, and has been honored by the University of Cyprus for his leadership in creating its Department of Architecture. He has also been named a "Great Cypriot".

Theo. David has been nominated for the European Union Mies van der Rohe Award and the ACSA/AIA Topaz Medallion for Excellence in Teaching. His work is entered into the archives of Pratt institute, the Benaki Museum of Art, Athens, and the Architecture and Design Library of MoMA.

Theo has lectured and served as guest critic at significant schools of architecture in the US and abroad. His work as architect and educator continues to be published, exhibited and discussed internationally.
