25.7.2025. | 1. These Regulations may be cited as the University of Cyprus (Student and Academic Affairs) Regulations of 2016 to 2025. |
| Academic Work and Objectives | 2. In realising the University’s objectives, as these are set out in subsection (2) of article 4 of the University of Cyprus Law, the University shall ensure:

(a) the provision of high-quality undergraduate and postgraduate programmes of study, which shall align and comply with recognised international standards and the general scientific developments in the relevant fields of knowledge, and shall be governed by the principles that apply to and emphasise the integrated character of European Higher Education; and

(b) the wider contribution of the University to the establishment and the promotion of a society of information and knowledge, as well as to the promotion of lifelong learning, by providing training programmes covering specialised scientific subjects and new developments or other subjects of broader interest. |
| Academic Qualifications. | 3. (1) The University may confer the following academic qualifications:

(a) “Degree”, upon the successful completion of undergraduate programmes of study;

(b) “Magister” (Artium/Scientae/Ingeniatorum, Engineering, Legum), or Master in Business Administration (MBA) or Master in Business Economics (MBE), upon the successful completion of a postgraduate programme of study (Master’s degree);

(c) “Doctoral Degree”, upon the successful completion of a postgraduate doctoral programme of study;

(d) other degrees, including honorary titles.

(2) In the context of inter-university programmes of study, the University may confer relevant degrees jointly with the collaborating higher education institutions. |

Procedure for determining the number of places offered to incoming students in undergraduate programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic. | (4) (1) Subject to the provisions of Regulation 5, the Council shall submit, for each academic year and no later than 31 January of the preceding calendar year, a recommendation to the Ministry of Education, Sport, and Youth regarding the total number of places offered by the University for each undergraduate programme of study that is offered in one of the official languages of the Republic. The Council may, for this purpose, take into consideration the recommendations of the Senate and the Boards of the Departments. |

(2) The Ministry of Education, Sport, and Youth shall submit a proposal to the Council of Ministers regarding the recommendation of the University, in which it shall express its views and the views of the Planning Bureau and the Ministry of Finance.

3(c) R.A.A. 225/2025.

(3) The Council of Ministers shall decide on the total number of student places to be offered for each undergraduate programme of study that is offered in one of the official languages of the Republic, no later than by the end of May of the calendar year preceding the academic year for which the number of students is approved.

Criteria for determining the number of places offered to incoming students in undergraduate programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic.

5. (1) The University, following consultation with the Ministry of Education and Culture, shall decide on the number of places to be offered for the undergraduate programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic, taking into consideration, inter alia, the following criteria:

(a) the existing supply and demand, determined by the needs of the market (in the private and public sectors), the objectives of the State as set out by the Ministry of Education and Culture, and the preferences of students.

(b) the potential of the University to support students concerning:

(i) the building facilities (e.g. classrooms, the restaurant, etc.);

(ii) the Academic Affairs and Student Welfare Service of the University;

(iii) the University Library and the IT Support Service of the University.

(c) the ability of the Departments to support the programmes of study in relation to:

(i) the academic and other teaching staff;

(ii) the administrative staff;

(iii) the specialised laboratories;

(iv) the consequent increase in supernumerary places, under subsection (5) of Article 29 of the Law on the Conduct of the Pancyprian Entrance Examinations for Admission to Higher and Tertiary Education institutions (AAEI) in Cyprus and Greece, as well as in supernumerary students and in equivalence and corresponding students.

(d) the maintenance of a high level of education in relation to:

- (2) For the purposes of the present Regulation:

"supernumerary students" means undergraduate students who are admitted based on special criteria to undergraduate programmes of study offered at least in one of the official languages of the Republic;

"Academic Affairs and Student Welfare Service" means the administrative service of the University that is responsible for academic affairs and student welfare;

"equivalence and corresponding students" means students who are referred by the Cyprus Council for the Recognition of Higher Education Qualifications to attend supplementary courses.

Determination of the number of places to be offered for undergraduate programmes of study offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic.

- 5A. (1) The number of places offered for undergraduate programmes of study that are offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic shall be determined by the Council of Ministers, following a recommendation of the Council to the Minister of Education, Sport, and Youth:

Provided that, the Council of Ministers shall announce, no later than January of each year, the undergraduate programmes of study to be offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic, the total number of places for each programme, as well as the amount of tuition fees.

- (2) The Council shall submit, for each academic year and no later than the end of June of the preceding calendar year, a recommendation regarding the total number of student places offered by the University for each programme of study that is offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic.

Publication of the number of places in programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic
6(b) R.A.A. 225/2025.

6. The number of places offered in the various Departments and/or programmes of study of the University that are offered in one of the official languages of the Republic shall be published by the end of each calendar year. This shall apply to the admission of students in the following academic year:

Provided that, admission to postgraduate programmes may occur in both the winter and spring academic semesters.

7. Any decision to introduce new programmes of study and to offer a number of places for study in them or any decision to increase the number of places offered in the previous year for incoming students in programmes of study offered in one of the languages of the Republic, which entails a burden on the annual budget of the University, shall be implemented only provided such a burden has been included in the annual budget and the latter has been approved by the competent bodies of the State.

8(a) R.A.A. 225/2025.
8. (1) Subject to the provisions of the Law on the Conduct of the Pancyprian Examinations, the criteria for the admission of students to undergraduate programmes of study that are offered in one of the official languages of the Republic, for a given academic year, shall be prescribed by Rules.
- 8(b) R.A.A. 225/2025.
- (2) The criteria for the admission of students to postgraduate programmes of study of the University shall be established by Rules regardless of the language in which they are offered. These criteria shall be published by the end of each calendar year and shall apply to the admission of students for the following academic year:
- Provided that, the possession of a recognised degree or an equivalent qualification shall be the main requirement for admission to a postgraduate programme of study.

- (3) The special criteria for the admission of students to undergraduate programmes of study that are offered in one of the official languages of the Republic shall be prescribed by Rules and shall be published ahead of the time at which those interested will be called to decide on their courses.

- Provided that, in a given academic year, up to 10% of the places available in undergraduate programmes of study may be offered by the University as supernumerary places in the undergraduate programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic for the admission of students from other Member States or third countries based on special criteria, and up to 15% of the places in undergraduate programmes of study for the admission of students based, primarily, on socio-economic criteria.

Admission to undergraduate programmes of study offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic.
- 8A. (1) The admission criteria to undergraduate programmes of study that are offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic shall be the following:
- (a) The possession of a school leaving certificate (apolytirion) issued by a Secondary Education Institution, recognised by the competent authorities of the country of origin;
- (b) very good knowledge of the foreign language in which the programme is taught, as determined by the accepted evidence

of language proficiency established by the Public Service Commission; and

- (c) success in international examinations such as the GCE, International Baccalaureate, or other equivalent international written examinations, or the Pancyprian Examinations, or other equivalent entrance examinations:

Provided that, candidates must have achieved the minimum required combination of grades, as determined by each Department of the University for each programme of study. In the case of admission through the Pancyprian Examinations or equivalent entrance examinations, priority shall be given to candidates with the highest scores:

Provided further that, candidates who have succeeded in the Pancyprian Examinations or equivalent entrance examinations shall be admitted to undergraduate programmes of study offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic at a rate of 20% in addition to the number of candidates admitted based on the other criteria in paragraph (c):

Provided further that, in the event that the available places are not filled by candidates based on the results of international examinations, these may be allocated to candidates who have succeeded in the Pancyprian Examinations or equivalent entrance examinations.

- (2) Admission to undergraduate programmes of study offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic shall not be permitted based on special criteria.
- (3) For inter-university undergraduate programmes of study, the admission system and criteria shall be determined by the Senate of the University and approved by the Minister of Education, Sport, and Youth.

Allocation and offer of places.
10(a) R.A.A. 225/2025.
22(I) of 2006.

9. (1) The allocation and offer of places at the University to candidates for admission to undergraduate programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic, in a given academic year, shall be conducted based on the system of admission to the Higher and Tertiary Education Institutions of Cyprus, provided for in the Law on the Conduct of the Pancyprian Examinations, as amended or replaced from time to time.
- (2) Following the allocation and offer of places under the provisions of the Law on the Conduct of the Pancyprian Examinations, any places in undergraduate programmes of study offered in one of the official languages of the Republic which have -
- (a) either remained vacant after the last allocation;

(b) either remained vacant because their holders cannot attend university in the following academic year;

(c) or have remained vacant because their holders did not accept them, shall be allocated based on the internal procedures of the University, as prescribed by Rules.

10(c) R.A.A. 225/2025.

(3) The ranking and final selection of candidates for undergraduate programmes of study offered in a language other than the official languages of the Republic shall be carried out according to internal procedures of the University, which shall be prescribed by Rules drawn up by the Senate and approved by the Council.

Undergraduate programmes of study.

10. (1) The normal duration of a programme of study leading to the award of a Bachelor's Degree shall be eight (8) semesters, and the maximum time allowed for its completion shall be twelve (12) semesters.

(2) A student may graduate earlier than the time specified in paragraph (1), provided that he/she has fulfilled all the obligations of his/her programme of study.

(3) The teaching load of an undergraduate programme of study, and in particular the number of ECTS credits to be obtained by the student, shall be prescribed by Rules.

(4) Undergraduate programmes of study may have an interdisciplinary character and may be established through interdepartmental collaborations.

(4A) Undergraduate programmes offered under bilateral agreements between the University and other recognised higher education institutions may have an inter-university character.

(5) Matters relating to attendance at undergraduate programmes of study may be regulated or prescribed by Rules.

(6) Without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (5), Rules made under this paragraph may provide for, inter alia, the following matters:

(a) the general rules for undergraduate programmes of study;

(b) the procedure for changing an undergraduate programme of study;

(c) the exemption of students from a foreign language course;

(d) the thesis;

(e) interdepartmental, interdisciplinary programmes of study;

- (f) student transfers.
- 11 R.A.A. 225/2025. Provided that, transfers shall not be permitted from an undergraduate programme of studies offered in one of the official languages of the Republic to a programme offered in another language and vice versa.
- Minor programmes of study. 11. (1) A student may enrol in and attend a minor programme of study while also attending his/her undergraduate programme of study.
- (2) The student shall complete the minor programme of study no later than twelve (12) semesters from the date of his/her admission to the University.
- (3) The criteria and the procedure for admission to and attendance at a minor programme of study, as well as the ECTS credits of the programme, shall be prescribed by Rules.
- Postgraduate programmes of study (Master). 12. (1) The minimum duration of a postgraduate programme of study (Master's) shall be three (3) semesters, and the maximum time allowed for its completion shall be eight (8) semesters.
- 12 R.A.A. 225/2025. (2) The criteria and the procedure for the admission of students to postgraduate programmes of study (Master's), regardless of the language in which they are offered, as well as other matters relating to attendance at such programmes, may be regulated or prescribed by Rules.
- 3 R.A.A. 134/2016. (2A) Postgraduate programmes of study (Master's) offered under bilateral agreements between the University and other recognised higher education institutions may have an inter-university character.
- (3) Without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (2), Rules made under this paragraph may provide for, inter alia, the following matters:
- (a) the categories of postgraduate programmes of study (Master's);
- 3 R.A.A. 134/2016. (aA) the offer of inter-university postgraduate programmes of study (Master's);
- (b) the student categories;
- (c) the establishment and operation of a committee for postgraduate programmes of study;
- (d) the appointment of Research and Academic Advisors;
- (e) the requirements of the postgraduate programme of study, including the number of ECTS credits to be acquired by the

student and any other criteria for obtaining the relevant degree, which may also include the writing of a dissertation;

- (f) the employment of postgraduate students (at the Master's level) to assist in teaching.

Postgraduate programmes of study at the doctoral level.

- 13. (1) The minimum duration of a postgraduate programme of study leading to the award of a Doctoral Degree shall be six (6) academic semesters of full-time attendance, while the maximum duration shall be sixteen (16) academic semesters.
- (2) The criteria and the procedure for the admission of students to a doctoral programme of study may be regulated or prescribed by Rules.

- (2A) Postgraduate programmes of study at the doctoral level offered under bilateral agreements between the University and other recognised higher education institutions may have an inter-university nature.
- (3) Without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (2), Rules made under this paragraph may provide for, inter alia, the following matters:
 - (a) the requirements of a postgraduate programme of study at the doctoral level and the criteria for obtaining the Doctoral Degree, including the writing of a doctoral dissertation;
 - (b) the supervision and examination of the doctoral dissertation;
 - (c) the employment of doctoral students to assist in teaching;
 - (d) the offer of inter-university postgraduate programmes of study at the doctoral level.

Certificates and attestations.

- 14. (1) In addition to the award of degrees, or in the event of attendance that does not lead to the award of a degree by the University, the University may issue certificates of attendance.
- (2) The University may issue any other certificates and attestations, in addition to those mentioned in paragraph (1), relating to its students and alumni.

Principles of teaching and learning methods.

- 15. Aiming to fulfil its teaching objectives and to maximise the efficiency and effectiveness of the educational process, the University shall:
 - (a) implement new teaching and learning methods, particularly those based on modern technological and information resources, and shall ensure the use of means grounded in the evolving technology of e-learning to complement existing traditional teaching methods and facilitate open and distance learning;
 - (b) explore new teaching and learning methods implemented in the European Union and more broadly, aiming to fully align with the education policy of the European Union.

- Teacher and student mobility.
16. The University shall promote teacher and student mobility, especially within the European Higher Education area, but also more broadly, including, inter alia, through:
- (a) the adoption and implementation of ECTS credits for all its programmes of study;
 - (b) the establishment of mechanisms for credit transfer and accumulation;
 - (c) the exchange of students and staff with other universities within the European Higher Education area, and more broadly;
 - (d) the signing and promotion of bilateral and multilateral agreements with external partners and, in particular, agreements aimed at promoting both scientific and educational objectives;

- (e) the development of inter-university programmes of study in cooperation with higher education institutions, recognised by the competent authorities of their country.
- ECTS credit.
17. The ECTS credit, as determined by a decision of the Senate from time to time, shall constitute the basic mechanism for measuring the teaching and other workload of the programmes of study of the University.
- Academic year and academic semesters.
18. (1) The academic year shall be divided into the winter and the spring academic semesters.
- (2) Each academic year shall cover-
- (a) teaching periods;
 - (b) periods of preparation for examinations;
 - (c) examination periods.
- (3) During the summer period, after the end of the spring academic semester and upon a decision of the Senate, permission may be granted for specific programmes of study to be conducted.
- Categories of courses.
19. The courses included in a curriculum may be divided into, inter alia, the following:
- (a) compulsory;
 - (b) restricted electives;
 - (c) free electives.
- Academic and Research Advisors.
20. (1) An Academic Advisor shall be appointed for each undergraduate student.

- (2) A Research Advisor shall be appointed for each postgraduate student writing a thesis at the Master's level, as well as for each doctoral student.
- (3) The responsibilities of the Academic and Research Advisors, as well as their obligations to students, shall be prescribed by Rules.
- General obligations of academic staff members. 21. (1) Every academic staff member has the basic obligation to perform with diligence and professionalism the teaching duties assigned to him/her by the Board of his/her Department, taking into consideration the general teaching obligations within the Department and the decisions of the Senate regarding the teaching load of academic staff members.
- (2) Every academic staff member shall also inform his/her students of his/her responsibilities, as well as of their own responsibilities, and shall provide them with the relevant course outline.
- (3) The course outline shall explain the objectives and the content of the course, as well as the teaching methods employed, and shall present how students will be assessed. The assessment method shall be in line with continuous assessment, as interpreted by the Senate.
- General obligations of students. 22. (1) Every student has the basic obligation to perform with diligence his/her duties as a student.
- (2) Every student shall prepare the schedule of his/her courses and other obligations per academic semester in close cooperation with his/her Academic and/or Research Advisor.
- (3) Course attendance shall be continuous and compulsory.
- (4) Every student shall be responsible for the successful completion of his/her studies.
- Assessment of programmes of study. 23. Each curriculum shall:
- (a) be continuously assessed and revised by the Board of the Department to which it belongs, aiming at its continuous improvement and ensuring that it meets its academic and social objectives in the best possible way;
- (b) be subject to regular assessment by renowned, independent, external assessors or under independent quality assessment and accreditation mechanisms at the national or European level.
- Suspension of studies. 24. (1) Any student may apply for suspension of his/her studies for a period which shall not exceed two academic semesters.
- (2) An academic semester during which the student has suspended his/her studies shall not be counted as part of the student's attendance.

- (3) The procedure for applying for suspension of studies, the responsibility for examining the application, and any other related matters may be regulated or prescribed by Rules.
- Temporary interruption of studies. 25. (1) The Senate may approve any student's application for a temporary interruption of his/her studies when serious medical reasons prevent the student from participating in the University's procedures.
- (2) An academic semester during which the student has interrupted his/her studies shall not be counted as part of the student's attendance.
- Removal from the Student Registry. 26. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (h) of Regulation 30, a student shall be removed from the Student Registry when he/she is unable to fulfil the requirements of his/her programme of study within the maximum time allowed for its completion, as specified in these Regulations, without having to exceed the full number of ECTS credits of an academic semester, as prescribed by Rules, for one or more of the academic semesters left.
- Disciplinary action against students. 27. (1) A student shall be subject to disciplinary action if he/she commits a disciplinary offence.
- (2) No disciplinary action may be taken against a student for the same disciplinary offence of which he/she has already been found guilty or acquitted.
- (3) A student who has withdrawn from his/her studies, in any way, shall not be subject to disciplinary action. Yet, any disciplinary proceedings that may have been initiated shall continue following his/her withdrawal, except in the event of death.
- (4) If a criminal charge is brought against a student, no disciplinary action may be taken or continued against the student for reasons related to the criminal charge until the latter is finally terminated.
- (5) A student who has been charged with a criminal offence and found not guilty may not be disciplined for the same offence; however, he/she may be charged with a disciplinary offence arising from his/her conduct, which is related to the criminal case but does not raise the same disputed issue as that of the charge in the criminal case.
- Disciplinary offences. 28. (1) A disciplinary offence is the violation of the laws, regulations, rules, and circulars of the University and the academic ethics in general.
- (2) The following disciplinary offences shall be considered serious:
- (a) Academic offences related to examinations, written assignments or cases of plagiarism.
- (b) Negligence in the management of the University funds or the University property of any kind.

- (c) Causing disturbances or engaging in misconduct that results in damage to University buildings or property.
 - (d) Misconduct on the University premises.
 - (e) Violation of safety and traffic rules within the University.
 - (f) Violation of safety rules concerning the University's electronic equipment or disruption of its normal operation.
 - (g) Photocopying more than 10% of a book and/or possessing such material within the University premises.
- (3) Minor disciplinary offences shall be considered those that do not fall within the serious disciplinary offences referred to in paragraph (2).
- Disciplinary procedure.
29. (1) No disciplinary action shall be taken unless a written complaint is submitted to the Disciplinary Control Committee.
- (2) Disciplinary action shall follow the procedure prescribed by Rules.
- (3) Disciplinary control shall be exercised in the first instance by a permanent Disciplinary Control Committee appointed by the Senate and ratified by the Council.
- (4) The decisions of the Disciplinary Control Committee shall be subject to review by the Senate, as a second-tier body, in accordance with the procedure prescribed by Rules.
- Disciplinary penalties.
30. The Disciplinary Control Committee shall decide, depending on the nature and gravity of the disciplinary offence, on the imposition of any of the following disciplinary penalties:
- (a) Verbal reprimand;
 - (b) written reprimand;
 - (c) grade penalties for misconduct related to examinations or assignments;
 - (d) (unpaid) community work at the University;
 - (e) suspension of rights/privileges, except those affecting learning;
 - (f) imposition of a fine for partial or total compensation for damages caused to University buildings or equipment, or any other property of the University.
 - (g) suspension from the University for a period of one or two semesters;
 - (h) removal from the Student Registry;
 - (i) a combination of the aforementioned penalties.

- Scholarships, awards, and allowances. 31. (1) The University may confer awards and grant scholarships and allowances coming from non-state sources.
- (2) The criteria and the procedure for awarding scholarships and granting awards and allowances may be prescribed by Rules.
- Student clubs. 32. (1) Students may form special clubs to promote cultural, social, athletic, or academic matters.
- (2) The purposes and activities of the clubs referred to in paragraph (1) shall be approved by the competent bodies of the University and shall be prescribed by Rules.
- (3) The establishment, registration and operation of student clubs may be prescribed by Rules.
- Rules. 33. (1) Subject to the approval of the Council, the Senate may make Rules for, or in relation to, the determination or regulation of any matter that requires or is subject to determination or regulation under these Regulations or whose determination or regulation is necessary for the implementation of these Regulations.
- (2) Without prejudice to paragraph (1), Rules may be made for, or in relation to, the following:
- (a) pre-registration, enrolment in and withdrawal from courses;
 - (b) the obligations of academic staff;
 - (c) examinations, including examinations for persons with disabilities or in special circumstances;
 - (d) student exchanges;
 - (e) individualised studies;
 - (f) incomplete courses;
 - (g) re-evaluation of a course for non-academic reasons;
 - (h) equivalence and corresponding students;
 - (i) automatic termination of attendance;
 - (j) inter-university programmes of study;
 - (k) the publication of an academic calendar, the schedule of classes, and the schedule of final examinations.
- (3) The Rules issued under these Regulations shall be published.
